The premise is simple: Lure the survivors into your vault, then protect them from invading forces and the ever-present threat of hunger and thirst. At the same time, you have to keep them happy enough to reproduce and rebuild humanity. It's a game that only takes a few minutes of your time, but often encourages you to send survivors on various missions, defend yourself from raids, and build new rooms in your vault. The game also opts for a cartoonist artistic style that translates the quaint Vault Boy into a charming — and creepy borderline — family of diligent vault dwellers. The game is now available on PCs, consoles, and mobile devices, and since it has no links to the aforementioned Fallout 4, you have nothing left to worry if not the survival of your people. Well, that and the radroaches. Shooter Destiny 2 Destiny 2 is the baby poster for the games-as-a-service model, but that doesn't mean it's a bad game. Far from it, in — Destiny 2 is a sprawling online shooter with ultra-narrow cannon mechanics and some of the most intense combat encounters in the game. Although originally released for a full \$60, Destiny 2 is now free to play. Even better, Bungie overhauled the leveling system once the price of the game dropped, so you don't have to worry about hundreds of grinding hours. Like many game titles as a service, though, Destiny 2 is what you think. The images are stunning and the mechanics are world-class, but facing the world alone is a lonely experience, even with the best weapons in Destiny 2. It is a game that is best played with friends, where the driving forces of progression are the wild experiences you will have during missions. Valorant Riot Games In recent months, we've seen two newcomers to the free-to-play shooter genre: Valorant and Crucible. The latter did not even survive a full launch. Valorant, thankfully, did. In short, Valorant is a competitive online shooter where you play games similar to Counter-Strike. There are two teams: one has the goal of planting the bomb (the peak), and the other is trying to spread it. In addition, Valorant adds a list of HEROES similar to MOBA. Valorant combines so many elements of other genres that it completely creates something new. The game plays like CS:GO, sure, but after a few rounds, it's clear that Valorant is operating on a different level. It's addictive, complex, and most importantly, free-to-play. Unfortunately, however, it is only available on PC. Call of Duty: Mobile We didn't think it was worth playing a Call of Duty game on mobile devices, but after the success of games like PUBG Mobile, we were willing to give Activision and Tencent the benefit of the doubt with Call of Duty: Mobile. We're glad we did, because it's one of the best first-person shooters we've ever played on the phone, and probably even more addictive than some of the console and PC games in the series. Composed of zombies, traditional multiplayer and battle royale, it offers a lot of variety and does not feature pay-to-win mechanics. The most amazing thing about Call of Duty: Mobile is how good it is to shoot weapons. Taking down a number of enemies with blows to the head is great, as is using your well-deserved rewards for the kill series to drop a turret or send a missile crashing to Earth. Team Fortress 2 Originally packaged inside The Orange Box in 2007, Valve's Team Fortress 2 was an instant hit in the realm of multiplayer shooters. The class shooter with nine differentiated classes featured a number of competitive game modes at the time of release, including Capture the Flag, King of the Hill, and many other objective-based modes. Though more than a decade old and obscured by a hero shooter called Valve has continued to support the PC version of the game in recent years. He went free in 2011 and now supports both ranked and random matches. Team Fortress 2 is not only a great game today, but it is an important part of video game history. You can enjoy the whole experience for free. If you wish, however, you can buy cosmetic items in the game. Paladins: Champions of the Realm A hero shooter from the creators of SmitE, Paladins: Champions of the Realm plays a lot like Overwatch. With four character classes - Frontline, Damage, Side and Support - and a unique card-based equipment system, Paladins manages to differentiate himself from the popular Blizzard FPS just enough not to be seen as a simple clone. The card-based equipment system adds strategic depth, giving you perks such as recovery time reductions for charge weapons, all of which are customizable. Each of the three game modes - Siege, Onslaught and team deathmatch - works well, the maps are varied and interesting. Planetside 2 Planetside 2 Planetside 2's massive battles make battlefield's spacious maps pretty tiny. This intergalactic FPS has a unique system as everything you do affects your faction's score. Three factions hunt him down to control important territories and take over the necessary resources. The most interesting thing about Planetside 2 is that battles can often take days, even weeks. They're just on such a big scale that when you break up, other members of the faction will pick up where you left off. With a deep customization system, intricate skill tree, and a wide range of combat scenarios, Planetside 2 rarely looks anything but fresh. Planetside 2 is available on PC and PS4. Counter-Strike: Global Offensive Counter-Strike: Global Offensive is, in fact, the first real counter-strike game. CS 1.6 and Source are both great, but Global Offensive is the game that stuck and it's easy to see why. Everything about CS:GO is tight, from gun games to map drawings. The whole game is about choices as you weave your story into the strange, perpetually dark city. Frog Fractions Frog Fractions is an educational game about being a frog. Presented through browsers for many years, the game is now available for free on Steam, with 4K support to boot.
